Is it possible to create root user ONLY during installation?

I want to create a Debian VM that run a single service, so I have no need for a non-root user. But the Debian netinstaller blocks me if I submit an empty non-root user name.

I know I can create the non-root user then delete it after installation, but maybe there is a way to bypass this during installation?

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

Maybe a [Debian cloud image](#) would be a better option? There are [versions for qemu/kvm](#) that can be persuaded to run in other VM environments.

A cloud image is a minimal Linux VM image that can be customized. I've used them extensively with OpenStack in the past, but also with kvm.

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In theory you should create a non-root user anyway, so you have a user you can log in as, since many/most Linux services don't by default allow direct logging in as root, even on headless, eg with SSH.

If you're going to be directly accessing a root terminal without needing to go over a network then I guess you won't need any non-root user. I just think it doesn't really take anything away by creating one anyway even if not using it.

It's possible that putting the installer in expert mode may allow you to skip this but I don't know, and I'd suspect not.

The former is fine if you use public keys and completely disallow remote password-based authentication though, which you should be doing anyway. Otherwise, you'd be logging into your 2nd account with your public key, and then entering your password again anyway during escalation, undermining some of the advantages of using public keys.

Running services as root is not a good idea though, I agree. Keep things separate. Don't log in as root when unnecessary.

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
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
