I went to Elmhurst. What you put into it is what you'll get out of it. It's a terminal masters so good for practitioners. Stats isn't that strong so if you want something very quant, it's not for you.

It is designed for working professionals so I found that to be a plus.

So consider, what's your end goal? Learn some stuff, get a foot in the door in the field? Then Elmhurst is a good bet. I find the success of students and graduates is mostly based on what they do with their internships (required) and how they network.

I graduated with my masters in 2014, got a F500 job at a CPG making 80k which was the best offer from my cohort. I'm now at 145k at F100 pharma. One of my peers worked there way into consulting after adding the one year mba option. They are now Sr manager at a big 4 bringing in 190k. Other folks I graduated with weren't as prosperous, they either went nonprofit (personal choice) or never made it out of their unrelated 9-5. My observation is that it isn't due to the education but personal ambition, poor networking.

So what job title are you looking for? Anything OD related- org effectiveness, culture, L&D...Elmhurst is good. Anything "I" related like data scientist...keep looking.

I worked with a project manager who went there. He was 9 years on the job before voluntarily resigning in April. He just got a job as a talent development manager at a financial consulting firm.

Like another commenter said, the school sets you up well for consulting. If that aligns with your career goals, go for it.

Speaking as someone else who attended an online program and who got both consulting and non-consulting offers, I have to be honest and say that these schools probably do not deserve the criticism they draw, especially since the pandemic. The internship requirement is far more important to your ability to find work than what concerns most people about these programs, such as not being as research-oriented.

All my opinion. But I have a due diligence to be truthful about my experiences.
